# UCHRA SAS CLIENT SUCCESS STORY: CHARLES RUNION



Charles Runion is a client of UCHRA's Substance Abuse Solutions (SAS) program. The following information was provided by the client and has been edited for length and clarity.

"Can you imagine having to bury your 41year-old father at the young age of 24 due to a drug overdose? Neither could I, but it happened," recalled Charles Runion.

Many people who grow up with drugaddicted parents end up losing both parents to drugs or see one or both parents remain addicted.

Charles' mother was fortunate, overcoming her addiction. His biological father, however, died; launching Charles' journey to Tennessee.

Charles, and his service dog Hero, moved from Michigan to Tennessee to be with his elderly great-aunt and uncle.

Unfortunately, following a series of miscommunications and, later, a falling out with a relative, Charles ended up homeless; living in his car. That's when Charles contacted UCHRA.

"They had this THP program... I know what you're thinking and, no, it wasn't the Tennessee Highway Patrol," he joked.

It was a Transitional Housing Program that offers temporary, transitional housing.

Charles still had to make ends meet in the meantime until an opening came up for the housing program.

"It was three weeks but it was well worth it," said Charles.

In the interim, the SAS team helped Charles with a tent, sleeping bag, gas to get to and from work, and showers.

"They go above and beyond, but you also got to do some work on your end, too," Charles said. "There is a saying that you can't help someone who doesn't want to be helped. So, if you ever find yourself to be less fortunate, there is hope."

Charles says UCHRA's SAS team helped him go from less fortunate to becoming successful.

In just 2 short months, Charles went from living in his car to now having an apartment that is nearly fully furnished.

This success was made possible thanks to donations made by members of the SAS team, Salvation Army, Walmart, Shell, the countless people who all worked together to help Charles move from homelessness to stability.
