Recently, UCHRA's LIHEAP program underwent an audit. Forty-two files were audited in the following counties: Clay, Cumberland, DeKalb, Fentress, Jackson, Macon, Overton, Pickett, Putnam, Smith, Warren, and White.

The timeframe audited ranged from October 2020 through April 2021. During that time, our county offices served 5,543 households and distributed more than \$2.48M in LIHEAP and Crisis LIHEAP services.

Congratulations, county office staff, on ZERO programmatic findings during this most recent audit -- this is a significant accomplishment considering the volume of LIHEAP!

Throughout the client's stay in the hospital and therapy, Cindy checked on her home and took care of checking the mail and doing the client's laundry. CLAY COUNTY AWARD, CONTINUED

Clay County, with assistance from UCDD, applied for and was awarded the amount of \$3,500 with no matching funds required. This is the second investment by the Tennessee Arts Commission for this project.

The Clay County government will continue the restoration of their historic courthouse, Tennessee's second-oldest operating courthouse in Tennessee. developing the upstairs courtroom as a theater. The courtroom has served as the venue for multiple plays and musical performances.

These grant funds have allowed for the purchase of additional sound and lighting equipment. Partners include the Clay County Chamber of Commerce, Upper Cumberland Development District, the Middle Tennessee State University (MTSU) Center for Historic Preservation, and local arts teachers.

The Tennessee Arts Commission invests in more than 700 nonprofit organizations across the state benefiting communities through quality of life, economic development, tourism and providing a more balanced education for our children.
