# CLIENT SUCCESS STORY: CORY CLENDENING

Cory Clendening is a client of UCHRA's Substance Abuse Solutions (SAS) program. The following information was provided by the client and has been edited for clarity.

At the age of 10, Cory Clendening began drinking. By age 12, he was using cocaine. And, for the last nine years, the 36-year-old was using methamphetamine.

In addition to his struggles with substance use, Cory has been homeless more than 20 times in his life.

However, after meeting with UCHRA's Substance Abuse Solutions team, Cory was able to get the assistance and support he needed to move beyond his addiction and achieve stability.

"I want a stable life," Cory said of his plans for the future. "I want to get a steady job and not worry about transportation and save up money and get my own place and have a successful (life).

"Success for me looks like going to work and having a home and getting my license back," he added. "Stay clean, go to meetings, and get involved in Celebrate Recovery."

Cory has shown intense motivation and willingness to change his life. He has now been off of the street for two months and has maintained sobriety for 30 days. He also begins his new job later this month.
