#### **RELATIVE CAREGIVER PROGRAM ADOPTION**

Shannon Banks has taken care of Lauryn and Lettie since March 2020 because both biological parents are justice-involved. Shannon petitioned the court for temporary custody so that she could enroll her nieces into school and to be able to take them to the doctor. DCS referred Shannon to RCP and was enrolled in February 2021. While in the program, RCP has assisted with rent so Shannon could get proper clothes and furniture for the girls, household basics, and electric bill assistance. They have also been able to enjoy the enrichments that RCP offers including Dollywood, Thrive in Cookeville, and Chuckles in Crossville. RCP has also helped with tee ball registration fees. Shannon married William Austin last May and expressed a desire to adopt the girls. RCP helped her find an attorney and, in October, RCP paid a large portion of the attorney fees. The adoption was finalized on March 25, 2022. *Congratulations, Shannon, William, Lauryn, and Lettie!*

### HENRY COMPLETES TAADAS CPRS SUPERVISION TRAINING

Congratulations to UCHRA employee Ryan Henry on the successful completion of Certified Peer Recovery Specialist Supervisor training.

This training is offered by by Tennessee Association of Alcohol, Drug and



other Addiction Services and the Tennessee of Mental Health Department and Substance Abuse. A Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) is someone who has selfidentified as being in recovery from mental illness, substance abuse, or co-occurring disorders of both mental illness and substance use disorder. To become certified, a CPRS has completed specialized To become training recognized by the Tennessee of Mental Health Department and Substance Abuse Services on how to provide peer recovery services based on the principles of recovery and resiliency.

Certified Peer Recovery Specialists can provide support to others with mental illness, substance abuse, or co-occurring disorder and help them achieve their personal recovery goals by promoting selfdetermination, personal responsibility, and the empowerment inherent in self-directed recovery.
